

2020-2021: Preparing Future Faculty Program

The Center for Teaching and Learning and the Office of the Graduate School completed the 2020-2021 Preparing Future Faculty Program in April with 27 successful PFF candidates. PFF is a year-long program offered to graduate students across campus to help in preparation for a career in academia. Topics presented by various faculty members and guest speakers include work-life balance, active teaching, lesson planning, research and scholarly activity, teaching philosophy, and preparing for a faculty interview.

Sachini N. K. Kodithuwakku Arachchige, a doctoral candidate in the Department of Kinesiology and PFF candidate in 2020-2021, joined the program "to help with professional development," and found that the program "helped me get more familiarized with the nature of an academic job." Sachini says the program "exceeded...expectations. I would highly recommend this program to all the PhD students interested in pursuing a career in academia in the future."

Sachini's advisor, Dr. Harish Chander, Associate Professor of Biomechanics and Co-Director of the Neuromechanics Laboratory at MSU, found the program "extremely well structured with critical topics covered in a timely manner." Knowing his students were involved in the program, "helped me greatly to understand what my graduate students are exposed to, which ultimately helped me cater my mentorship to them." Finally, he described the PFF program as "an extremely unique initiative that sets the grad students on the best path to be successful in higher education and academia."

July 7: Last day for initial submission to Library

July 30: Last day for final submission to Library

August 3: Last day for non-thesis comprehensive exams for August graduation

August 3: Deadline to pass thesis/ dissertation defense after all other requirements are met except thesis/ dissertation submission to Library, allowing student to enroll in GRD 9011 in Fall semester and apply for December graduation
